Mindmap 1.0 focused on early detection within Greater New Haven and referred patients to the Specialized Treatment for Early Psychosis (STEP) Clinic.



Phone inquiries per year **increased by 777**%

Number of patients declining treatment decreased by 52%

The CALM Campaign

Clear Answers to Louisiana's Mental Health (CALM) is the psychosis awareness campaign for the Early Psychosis Intervention Clinic New Orleans (EPIC-NOLA). Early Detection Assessment Coordinator

EDACs are the STEP team members who will be working the referral line, screening for psychosis, and connecting individuals to treatment.



LMHA

Local Mental Health Authority

LMHAs are DMHAS operated or DMHAS funded providers that offer a wide range of mental health programs and services. In support of our mission, they have agreed to be our referral network for the Mindmap campaign.

EDACs

The EDACs are each assigned to a region of CT where they will be a point of contact for the LMHAs and individuals and families experiencing FEP in that area.

- Screening
- Diagnostic evaluation & structured assessment of early psychosis patients

Eligibility:

- FEP (3 yrs)
- Not in Services
- 16-35 yrs old
- Consent

Ineligible individuals will be directed to the appropriate service

To provide overview of symptoms, demographics, and service outcomes

Rapid referral to their local LMHA

Assessment summary made available to LMHA Assist with engagement to local LMHA

EDAC + LMHA ongoing meetings

Support with consultation line and trainings

3 months:

- Did they engage
- Can we support this process further?

WHAT MINDMAP IS OFFERING TO LMHAS



Nope!

- Clinical intervention (although we can support via STEP-Consult Service)
- A new service (like STEP)
- Any sort of interference with established referral and treatment pathways

Mindmap 2.0 Expands Across Connecticut

Public Awareness Campaign Promotes Early Treatment of Psychosis in Teens/Young Adults; Confidential Referral Phone Number Available 24/7

[January 20, 2024, New Haven, CT] — Building on the monumental success of Mindmag, a highly visible public awareness campaign running from 2015-2019 that decreased the Duration of Unitreated Psychosis (DUP) by half in young people in Greater New Haven, Mindmap 2.0 will reach beyond its predecessor's 10-town radius and expand statewide on February 1, 2024.


A STEP Learning Collaborative initiative hosted by the Specialized Treatment Early in Psychosis (STEP) clinic at Valle University School of Medicine and supported by the Connecticut State Department of Mental Health and Addiction Services (DMHAS), Mindrang 2.0 aims to help more team and young adults (ages 16-35) receive early detection and treatment of psychosis by calling STEP's confidential, 24/7 referral phone number – 203-200-0140.

Callers will be asked for basic information and receive a call back from one of STEP's Early Detection Assessment Coordinators (EDACs) to screen for symptoms of psychosis and connect to one of several statewide Local Mental Health Authorities (LHMA), which are operated and/or funded by DMHAS and accept and provide mental health services to every individual who qualifies.

The goal is to get more people experiencing psychosis for the first time into treatment states," said Vands Strikani, MD, professor of psychistips, 4 Yale School of Medicine and director of STEP and Mindrago, 1 encourage the community to actively assist us in swiftly guiding Individuals and Intallist toward receiving care at STEP. The earlier someone with psychosis gets help, the better chance of recovery and living a fulfilling life.

Timeline

Phone calls and marketing are happening statewide starting today. We will be hosting live events for each of the regions throughout the lifetime of the campaign.
